Policy Update and Discussion-Jason McGill	<ul> <li>Provided an overview of general areas of concern related to federal issues and legislation.</li> <li>Healthcare policy directives from administration are not yet clarified</li> <li>Competing interests &amp; factions at congressional level driving policy</li> <li>Provided an overview of what's specifically at stake for Washington State-please reference the attached document 'The Affordable Care Act Post 2016: What's at Stake for Washington'.</li> </ul>



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	<ul> <li>Reviewed impact of McCleary (funding basic education) and obligations needing to be addressed in the current legislative session.</li> <li>Discussed mental health system reform, transformation to a community based system and transition of state hospitals to increase forensic focus</li> <li>Discussed the integration of behavioral health and physical health care and consequent organizational restructuring with the Behavioral Health Administration moving to the Health Care Authority and related licensing/monitoring functions moving to the Department of Health.</li> <li>Discussed the integration of children, youth and family services and creation on new department pending passage of legislation</li> <li>Discussed convergence of opioid, heroin and homelessness</li> <li>Shared information on the latest revenue forecast</li> </ul>
ALTSA Update-Bill Moss	<ul> <li>Discussed Accountable Communities of Health (ACH) and importance of LTSS representation. (<i>currently Phil Lemley serves on his regional ACH and Ron Vivion serves on the HILN</i>) Bill requests additional focus on ACH's at a future meeting to provide more time to discuss in detail</li> <li>ALTSA staff will send additional information about ACH's to Council members</li> <li>Extended thanks to Cheryl for her continued participation in the Dementia Action Collaborative</li> <li>Provided an update on Medicaid Transformation Waiver</li> <li>Imperative that behavioral health supports are in place for ALTSA to meet its commitment to support individuals transitioning out of Western State Hospital</li> <li>Health Care Authority would like to contract with a third party administrator for supported employment and supported housing components</li> <li>Discussed the following bills         <ul> <li>HB 1153 , HB 1492, HB 1545, HB 1548, HB 1636, HB 1671, SB 5060,</li> <li>If you have questions or concerns about a bill please free to contact Bill</li> <li>Senator Cody convened a meeting about mandatory training requirements for individual providers/barriers to training; possible there may be a workgroup in budget proviso, if so would be good to have a Council member participate.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

	Washington State Council on Aging 2017 Legislative Priority: Support passage of legislation increasing penalties for abuse and financial exploitation of vulnerable adults
	<ul> <li>Companion bills are under consideration: SHB 1153 and SSB 5099</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>SHB 1153, Concerning crimes against vulnerable persons, passed out of House Appropriations with a strong (29-2) "do pass" recommendation, with two Members excused. The Committee adopted the amendment proposed by Bill Moss and DSHS.</li> </ul>
	The bill moves on to <u>House Rules Committee</u> , and needs a member of the Rules Committee to pull the bill and pass off to the House floor by March 8.
	<ul> <li>The companion bill, SSB 5099, passed out of Law and Justice Committee with a "do pass" recommendation.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>It was referred to the Senate Ways and Means committee and on February 20, it had a hearing and testimony was given in support (this is a major AARP effort area). The bill needs to be voted out NLT Friday in order to stay alive.</li> </ul>

	Washington State Council on Aging 2017 Legislative Priority: Support increase in case management staff to decrease client case ratios, and better manages increasingly complex clients
	<ul> <li>Adding funds to reduce case management loads will allow sufficient home visiting to assure the safety and well-being of seniors and people with disabilities.</li> </ul>



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	<ul> <li>\$5.18 million General Funds State (\$10.35 million including federal match) will reduce case-load ratios to 75 clients per case manager (a manageable workload level).</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>In other states our clients would be in nursing homes—we are innovators in helping people age at home. But as clients get sicker and have more cognitive problems, they are more vulnerable to abuse and neglect.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>DSHS states "Lack of adequate oversight results in poor client health outcomes, unnecessary expensive institutional stays, gaps in caregiving, homelessness, and delays in identifying potential abuse, neglect and exploitation or Medicaid fraud."</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>AAA clients need case managers to visit them at home to make sure caregivers are doing their jobs properly and check if clients need more help.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Example: Because of inadequate time for home visits Case Manager learned, after- the-fact via an APS complaint, that a family caregiver had ceased providing care and taken the client's car and money. Client is now homeless.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Washington State Council on Aging 2017 Legislative Priority:</li> <li>Support implementation of the Medicaid 1115 Waiver (Medicaid Alternative Care for unpaid family caregivers and Tailored Supports for Older Adults)</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Support restoration of adequate funding to keep the Long Term Care</li> <li>Ombudsman program operating</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Program provides volunteer ombudsmen to monitor treatment of vulnerable adults living in adult family homes.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>50% of funding has been cut since 2010, resulting in dramatically lowered service levels –</li> </ul>
	■ 2010 – 60,049 volunteer hours
	<ul> <li>2015 – 38,519 volunteer hours</li> <li>Increase in funding will help add and train additional volunteers</li> </ul>



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	<ul> <li>State Ombudsman Office requests \$350,000 added funds in 2017-2 biennium</li> <li>Monitor and support activities of the Joint Legislative Executive Committee Aging and Disability issues and advocate for the continuation of the JLEC beyond its current mandate</li> <li>Barry suggested being very specific, e.g. will you support \$5.8 million to reduce</li> </ul>	
	caseloads to 1:75 and also asking legislators to send a letter to Senator Braun (if they support the request)  Art Swannack is participating in a roundtable meeting with Senator Cantwell today about ACA and implications for approaches, i.e. per capita caps, block grants.	
Partner Updates W4A update- Cathy Knight	<ul> <li>Key Points</li> <li>Discussed status of state legislation related to personal needs allowance increase, coverage for hearing aids and methods of services provided by the Office of Public Guardianship (OPG)</li> <li>Focused on what is going on at the federal level</li> <li>All very concerned about Medicaid block grants and overall implications of ACA repeal and replace</li> <li>AARP is involved</li> <li>Staff met with an aide to Representative Newhouse</li> <li>Senator Cantwell is conducting a meeting tomorrow about impact of changing to Medicaid block grants</li> <li>Ron Vivion shared that he's meeting with Representative DelBene on Friday to discuss Veterans issues</li> </ul>
