ALTSA Update Bea Rector	 Key Points 1115 waiver- received final CMS agreement and it's posted on the Health Care Authority website- working on correcting some details and sending back to CMS Statement of Special Conditions can be found here: <u>http://www.hca.wa.gov/about-hca/healthier-washington/medicaid-transformation</u> Need to have approved specific multiple protocols, e.g., tribes, evaluation, funding -latter needed for draw down of funds Continuing to work with AAA on planning and implementation MAC and TSOA-there were just a couple of adjustments needed in the waiver. One was related to financial eligibility for TSOA





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	 Other issue is around presumptive eligibility- when client is in critical need of services we want be able to provide assistance as soon as possible and. presumptive eligibility allows us to ask presumptive questions which allow us to provide services- CMS said yes to presumptive. Also not requiring to screen for citizenship status. Special terms and conditions 	
	are always renegotiable- from federal and state side- so if CMS said no to current aspect it would take about 6 months to change because of appeal process	
	 July 1 is implementation date- AAA's are also very busy preparing 	
	 1115 has listening sessions coming up-intent is to go over terms and get some public feedback and provide opportunity for Q/A 	
	 Are conducting 9 of them -most are in evenings and couple are on weekends Scheduling a stakeholder webinar in February that will be deeper dive- there are legal advocates and other that are interested in knowing what information people are getting to access this option 	
	Overtime Policy Implementation	
	 continue to work on implementation of OT, 	
	• The number of contract actions we've needed to take are much higher than we'd like to see- multiple thousands per month. Workers first get a warning then 2nd warning (get a written and phone warning)	
	 3rd action is termination of contract for 90 days (which is worrisome) 	
	 We are doing this work at Headquarters to remove workload impact from the field. 	
	 There is legislation that proposes to not have work week limits for parents with adult children with disabilities and changing limit of work week hours. 	
	 We need to assess impact on budget and the ability to live within the budget cap prescribed for overtime 	
	 Very tough policy to implement; requires ongoing mitigation of multiple impacts Implementation has required that clients change longstanding practice and is 	
	very challenging	
	Aruna asked about workers in rural areas	





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	 The concern is determining that clients have done due diligence to find another worker, but difficult where you have client who says no one else that can do it the way the person I have has done work; not seeing this as rural /urban issue Really have to look at client situation and do due diligence before we can say that an exception can be made Client has been determining work hours for years so transition to state control is significant adjustment Art asked if there is an assessment of what worker is doing during allocated hours Typically the high need of client is verifiable(through detailed assessment process) The concern is more about the safety of worker and client We are doing analysis of coverage- discerning if there are patterns of purposeful action to not abide new overtime requirements. 	
	LTSS Actuarial Study and next steps	
	 Milliman has completed their report It's in final review with OFM and then will go to legislature ALTSA has included a report on LTSS, demographics, diversity of services needed in order to provide more context to the actuarial report Report was asked to look at two options a public long-term care benefit for workers, funded through a payroll deduction that would provide a time-limited long-term care insurance benefit; and a public-private reinsurance or risk-sharing model, with the purpose of providing a stable and ongoing source of reimbursement to insurers for a portion of their catastrophic long term services and supports losses in order to provide additional insurance capacity for the state

	On federal level there are a lot of potential changes	
	Currently there is a 90% match on federal level	



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	 Expansion is a question CFCO is the way most LTSS are delivered and includes enhanced +6% match is part of the Affordable Care Act as are Health Homes and the CMS Innovation programs A paper addressing implications of changes to ACA has been provided to OFM to share with the state's congressional delegation Discussed how block grants work –will forward some additional analysis Concern with block grants is that state is given a lump sum and that may not keep up with expanding population Another approach being worked on based on per capita caps Intent is to save federal expenditures in healthcare and LTSS Will forward relevant policy papers
