

Crisis Intervention Training

The Trueblood v. DSHS lawsuit challenged unconstitutional delays in competency evaluation and restoration services for individuals detained in city and county jails. The Trueblood Contempt Settlement Agreement establishes a plan for providing services to persons involved in the criminal court system and for providing treatment to people when needed so they are less likely to become involved in the criminal court system. The Trueblood Contempt Settlement Agreement includes a plan for phasing in programs and services:

- Phase 1 [2019-2021]: Pierce, Southwest, and Spokane regions including Pierce, Clark, Skamania, Klickitat, Spokane, Ferry, Stevens, Adams, Lincoln, and Pend Oreille counties.
- Phase 2 [2021-2023]: King region/county
- Phase 3 [2023-2025]: Thurston, Mason, and Salish regions including Thurston, Mason, Clallam, Kitsap, and Jefferson counties.

The Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission provides the crisis intervention team model to all public safety agencies as a form of community policing to improve public safety responses to people experiencing a behavioral health crisis. Police, fire, and medical personnel work together with behavioral health services to provide help to people experiencing a behavioral health crisis.

CIT and the Trueblood settlement

As part of the Trueblood Contempt Settlement Agreement, the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission is offering crisis intervention team training in the Pierce, Southwest, Spokane, King and Salish regions by:

- Providing eight-hour CIT course to all correction officers in these regions
- Providing eight hours of CIT training to all dispatchers in these regions
- Providing the 40-hour CIT course to 25 percent of law enforcement officers in these regions

CJTC is leading this part of the Trueblood Contempt Settlement Agreement in close collaboration with the Department of Social and Health Services, local law enforcement agencies and community stakeholders. In a separate but related component of the Trueblood Contempt Settlement Agreement, the Washington Association of Sheriffs & Police Chiefs is enhancing its mental health field response program, which pairs mental health professionals with law enforcement officers.
