The Nooksack Youth and Family Services Department facilitates the CPT meetings once a month. The WA DCYF staff also attend CPT to gather advise from the CPT regarding cases of child abuse and neglect being investigated by their office. The CPT is a highly confidential team established to advocate, protect, and promote the care of Nooksack children and families.

Extended Foster Care: The Extended Foster Care Program is a great benefit for Nooksack young adults who need ongoing support while working towards independence. Now providing services for individuals up to 21 years of age.

Indian Child Welfare Program and Independent Living: The Nooksack Youth and Family Services Department staffs two caseworkers who actively

work in partnership with Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families to provide case management and advocacy for Nooksack families that are culturally sensitive. The Youth and Family Services Caseworkers strive to assist families with resources and services needed to support family preservation and ensure children remain connected to the Tribal family and community. The Independent Living Program provides additional services for our Nooksack children who are 15 years or older and in an open dependency through DCYF or through Nooksack Tribal Court. Independent Living Services include various services to support Nooksack youth into young adulthood with the tools necessary for independent living.

TI'ils Ta'á'altha Program: Employing a 24/7 advocate and a Civil Legal Attorney to assist families to achieve safety with protection orders, parenting plans, and other justice matters for victims of harm. The TI'ils Ta'á'altha program also provides cultural healing for participants to engage with Tribal elders and learn or practice traditional healing therapies such as weaving, canning, quilting, etc. The TI'ils Ta'á'altha program also provides emergency hotel stay for families needing safety from harm.

The Men and Boys Outreach and Advocacy Program: Includes an advocate to provide advocacy services, education, and awareness to individuals and the community.

Family Services: We offer crisis intervention and case management for elders and families. We have extensive information of local network resources for referral that we use to assist those in need of comprehensive services and to help clients with basic needs.

Goodheart Behavioral Health: Substance Abuse: Goodheart Behavioral Health provides Adult Intensive Outpatient substance use disorder treatment. Substance Abuse assessments (18 years and older) can enroll into Outpatient Treatment (OP). We offer ASAM Criteria Level 1 sessions two hours per week and ASAM Criteria Level 2.1 sessions six hours per week. We also offer referral assistance with admission into other facilities for Inpatient Treatment, and we work with Court ordered deferred prosecutions. The Aftercare/Relapse Prevention Program is available for adults who have completed Inpatient, Outpatient, and Intensive Outpatient programs and need continued care and support.

Goodheart Behavioral Services: An assessment of individual Mental, Emotional, Physical, and Social needs and treatment planning will occur in the individual or group therapy session. Psychiatric medication management will be available pending program approval. All Goodheart Behavioral Health/Mental Health services and treatment levels use culturally appropriate assessments, group and individual therapy sessions, and Native focused psycho education classes.

Indian Child Welfare: We provide advocacy and support for Native American families and children at risk and/or involved with DCYF and local Tribal CPS. We will find support services within AICC and network for

services of unmet needs with housing, utilities, transportation, financial income, food, medical benefits, substance abuse, needs for assessments, and in/outpatient treatment services. We will refer clients to obtain legal assistance through Northwest Justice Project. We will educate families of DCYF/Tribal ICW policy and procedure. Collaborating services are offered by DCYF/Tribal ICW to assist families with compliance of court orders. We offer parenting workshops with a cultural aspect, Positive Indian Parenting, referral for more specific parenting directed towards family's needs, domestic violence and/or drug addiction concerns and needs.
