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## Medical Assistance Program

### Medical Assistance Program

This section summarizes medical-only cases. These cases do not include cash-related medical and are also known as Non-Grant Medical Assistance Programs.

#### Highlights:

- The average monthly Medical Assistance caseload in SFY 2009 was 560,987.
- Examples of the average monthly composition of the Medical Assistance caseload in SFY 2009 include:
  - Children's Medicaid, a monthly average of 195,160 (or 34.8%)
  - SSI Medicaid, a monthly average of 106,125 (or 18.9%)
  - Medicare Savings Program, a monthly average of 84,368 (or 15.0%)
  - TANF-related Medicaid, a monthly average of 32,418 (or 5.8%)
  - Pregnancy Medicaid, a monthly average of 29,418 (or 5.2%)

Program Type	Description	Avg. Monthly Caseload <sup>1</sup>
<b>Children's Medicaid</b>	Children of low-income families (or non-needy relatives) under one year of age. Family income cannot exceed 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).	195,160
<b>SSI Medicaid</b>	Aged, blind and disabled persons who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI). The Social Security Administration determines eligibility for SSI using income rules based on Title XVI of the Social Security Act.	106,125
<b>Medicare Savings Program</b>	Programs pay Medicare premiums, coinsurance, and deductibles for low-income Medicare beneficiaries. Income limits vary depending on program from 100% of FPL to 200% of FPL.	84,368
<b>TANF-Related Medicaid</b>	Families eligible for TANF who choose not to receive any cash benefits. Native Americans on Tribal TANF receive TANF-related medical authorized by CSD field staff.	32,418
<b>Pregnancy Medicaid</b>	Low-income pregnant women. Categorically Needy (CN) income limit is 185% of the FPL.	29,418
<b>Newborn Medicaid</b>	Automatic coverage for infants up to one year of age born to women who received Medicaid at the time of birth.	25,823
<b>Post Pregnancy Family Planning Extension</b>	Up to 10 months of automatic family planning coverage when the pregnancy ends.	24,919
<b>Post-TANF Transitional Medicaid</b>	Families automatically eligible for coverage when they leave TANF or TANF-related Medicaid due to increased earnings or child support collections.	22,595
<b>SSI-Related Medicaid</b>	Low-income aged, blind, or disabled persons who do not receive SSI cash benefits.	21,922

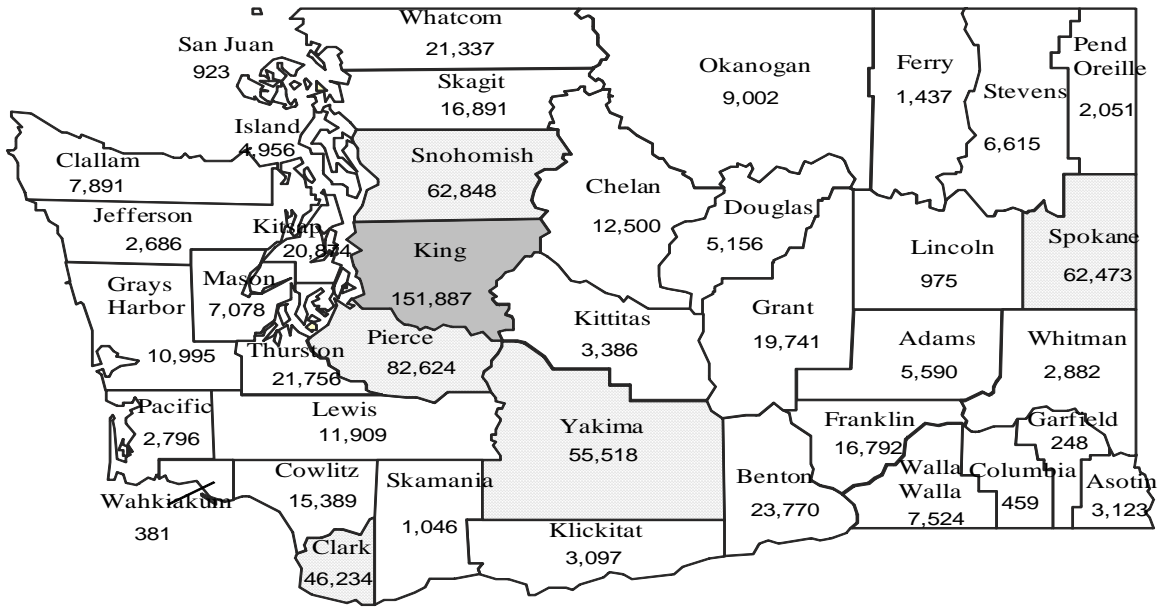

## Medical Assistance Program

<b>Long Term Care</b>	Medical assistance to our most vulnerable populations, such as developmentally disabled individuals, adults and children inpatient psychiatric care, families in need of nursing home assistance, and hospice.	11,894
<b>Healthcare for Workers with Disabilities</b>	Disabled persons who are working and who do not receive SSI. Premium amounts are based on income. Income cannot exceed 220% of the FPL.	1,307
<b>Alien Emergency Medicaid</b>	Federally funded program for immigrants who would qualify for full-scope Medicaid except for their alien status. Coverage is limited to emergency medical condition (pregnancy is not considered an emergency medical condition).	543
<b>Refugee Medical Assistance</b>	Refugees who do not qualify for cash assistance. Eligibility ends after the first eight months of residency in the U.S.	152

## Number of Medical Clients by Residential County in Washington State: June 2009

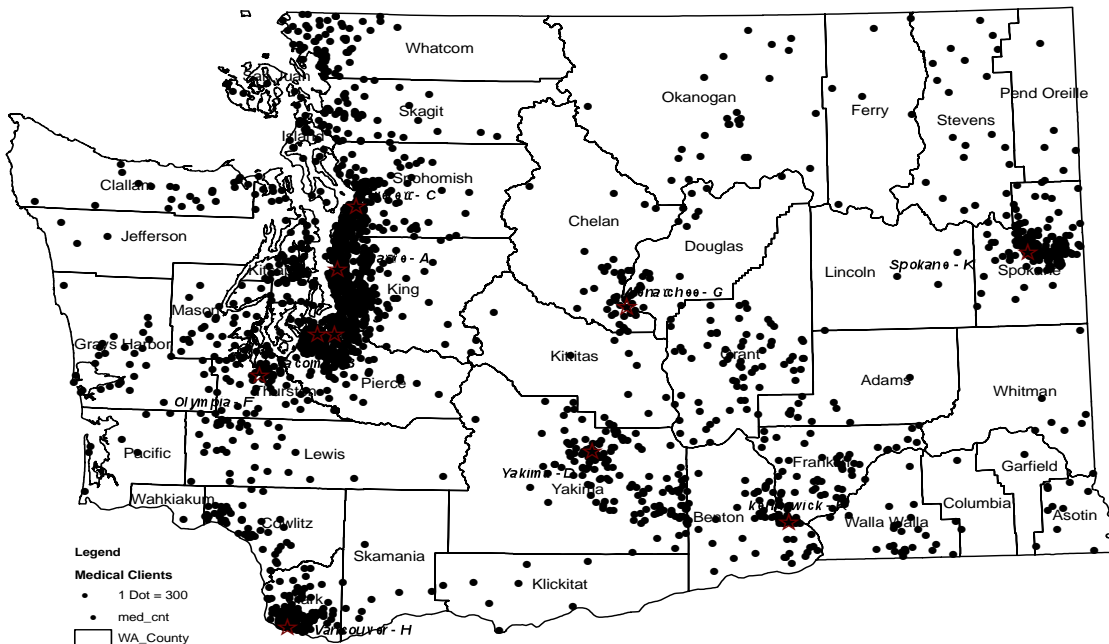
