Individual has 30 days to respond.</li> <li>If no response, individual is served with an official notice his/her license will be certified for suspension if he/she does not make arrangements to begin/resume making support payments. Notice is sent 1st class mail on cases with WA Superior Court orders and personally served by USPS Certified Mail or by Personal Service in cases with foreign orders.</li> <li>An additional 20 days from the date the individual is served are given to respond.</li> <li>If no response is received, DCS attempts to contact individual by phone or letter again to warn of potential of losing driver's license and additional time is given to respond (20-30 days).</li> <li>After no response or effort by obligor to remedy the situation, DCS proceeds with license certification for suspension.</li> </ol> </li> <li>An individual may go up to 9-12 months without making a child support payment before license is certified for the first time. Individuals can remedy situation at any time by making payment arrangements with DCS case worker so license can be re-instated. Clients may also reach out to their SEO in situations where they need their license for upcoming employment or to be hired.</li> </ul>

NCP is a member of the Yakama Nation (YN).

or

NCP is employed by the Yakama Nation , tribal enterprise or Indian owned business.

Or

There is a **Tribal Court order** on the case that needs to be modified to set child support.

or

NCP is Unknown, CP is a member of the Yakama Tribe.

Or

CP receives Tribal TANF (This is decided case by case. The Tribal Liaison in the Field Office with Tribal TANF will contact you when they receive the Tribal TANF referral)

Other jurisdictional issues exist (case by case basis).
