Hi, Bob

The estimates I calculated were as follows:

In 1989, 8.5 percent of WA household incomes were \$75,000 or more, thus the schedule was advisory for approximately 8.5 percent of WA households.

In 1999, 24.2 percent of WA household incomes were \$75,000 or more, such that the schedule is now advisory for approximately 24 percent of WA households.

Of course, these are not exact figures. For one thing, I had to translate "net" into "gross" income. My adjustment (net = 72 percent of gross) was based on figures from the FinalGrant205.pdf on the DCS website, pg. 61. The income figures came from the Census Bureau which provides the percent of Washington State's households at different income levels. (That's a messy web site address for me to copy -- let me know if you want me to fax you the two tables - 1989 and 1999 - that I used.)
