

What is the Division of Child Support (DCS)?

DCS is:

- A nationally top-ranked, technologically premier child support enforcement organization.
- Part of the Economic Services Administration in the Washington State Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS).
- A highly skilled, culturally diverse organization with a passion for helping children.

What does DCS look for in an employee?

We're looking for individuals who show integrity, initiative, commitment to customer service, willingness to talk to and work with people, interest in continuously improving our work and the ability to:

- Solve problems; both legal and mathematical
- Communicate and manage multiple tasks
- Make independent decisions
- Previous experience with electronic caseload management is helpful



What are the job duties of a Support Enforcement Officer (SEO)?

SEOs work in teams. They manage child support caseloads and communicate with customers on the phone, in the office and in writing.

SEOs:

- Collect child support by:
 - Enforcing superior court orders and
 - Setting up (establishing) and enforcing administrative orders.
- Refer cases to prosecuting attorneys for:
 - Child support enforcement, paternity establishment and changing (modifying) orders.
- Explain and apply:
 - Federal and state laws.
 - Policies, procedures and
 - Other legal decisions.

What training can I expect?

Training includes reading, presentations, exercises and casework that covers all federal and state program information.

A lead worker supports your work during your 12-month training period and beyond as needed.

What is an SEO's work schedule?

SEOs work 40 hours a week Monday through Friday. SEOs are covered by a Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Washington Federation of State Employees and are required to join the Federation.
