DSHS Developmental Disabilities Administration Group Homes

Overview

Group Homes offer person-centered instruction and support in a community-based, licensed residential facility that typically serve five to 12 adults. The services are based on individual need and shared support within the household. Services are offered in an integrated setting and support personal power, choice and full access to the community. Service can vary from a few hours to up to 24 hours per day.

Group homes are provider owned or leased. Individuals living in a group home keep a portion of their monthly income for personal needs. The remainder of the individual's income is used to cover food, shelter and the cost of care based on income and type of income.

Group homes contract statewide with Department of Social and Health Services' Developmental Disabilities Administration. Group homes are licensed as assisted living facilities or adult family homes in addition to being certified by DSHS' Residential Care Services Division. The license identifies the number of people allowed in each home.

Eligibility Requirements

DDA clients who are:

- 18 years of age or older.
- Currently on or approved for Home and Community-Based Services' Core waiver.
- Assessed to need support in a group home to meet their health and welfare needs in their Person-Centered Service Plan.



Budget

A total of 44 individuals are supported in group homes statewide as of Sept. 1, 2023.

Rates

Group home rates are based on the client's assessment and a tiered rate is determined. The reimbursement for each tier can be found in the "SL and GH" tab at Developmental Disabilities rates.

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Oversight

DSHS uses a formal process to evaluate provider compliance with laws, DDA policies and the DDA contract. DSHS' Residential Care Services Division evaluates contracted agencies at least every two years.
