DSHS' Division of Vocational Rehabilitation provides Transition Services to support and provide guidance to students and youth with disabilities as they prepare for the workforce.

Transition Services can help youth and students:

- Build job skills.
- Explore career interests.
- Upgrade self-advocacy skills.

Job Exploration

Learn about different job fields, what job interests you may have and skills you may need to have to be successful.

Workplace Readiness Training

Learn about and gain skills to be ready for employment, including job-related independent living skills.

Self-Advocacy


Learn about and gain skills on how to advocate for yourself and request accommodations you may need to be successful.

Post-Secondary Education Counseling

Learn and receive guidance about options for continued education and training after high school in your areas of interest and abilities.

Work-Based Learning

The opportunity to participate in activities to learn about the workplace in your community.



School-to-Work

The School-to-Work program supports students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The benefits of School-to-Work can be:

- Giving students the chance to get a job before they graduate and leave school.
- Helping students connect to important adult services that can support them.
- Encouraging students to take an active role in planning for their future.
